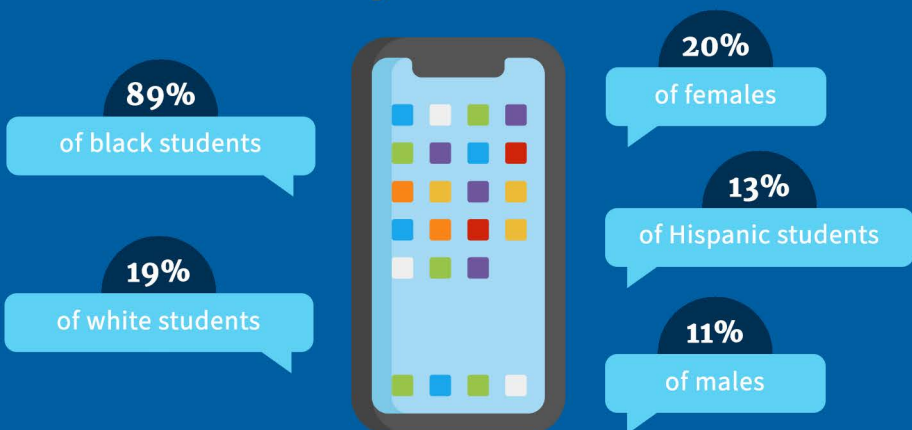
What is **Cyberbullying**?

Cyberbullying is bullying that takes place using electronic technology such as social media, video gaming, chat rooms, instant messaging, and all other forms of digital electronic communication. 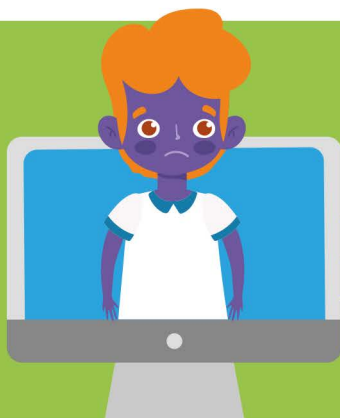
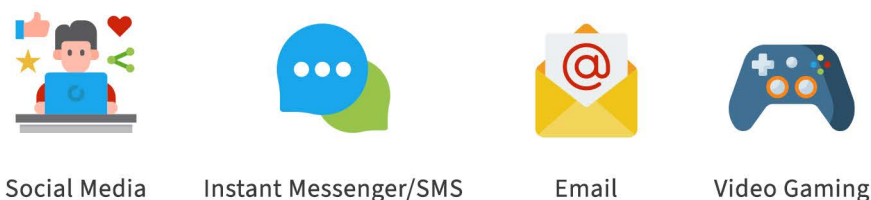
Who is **Cyberbullied**?
